The Consequences of Gentile Apostasy (vv. 21-32)

The Formulation of Idolatry (vv. 21-23)

VERSE 21 For even though they knew God, they did not honor Him as God or give thanks (διότι γνόντες τὸν θεὸν οὐχ ὡς θεὸν ἐδόξασαν ἢ ηὐχαρίστησαν [conj. dioti "For even" + aor.act.part.nom.m.p. ginosko know + d.a.w/noun acc.m.s. theos + neg ouk + conj hos as + noun acc.m.s. theos + aor.act.ind.3p. doxazo glorify, honor + part. e or, neither + aor.act.ind.3p. ercharisteo thank; "give thanks"], but they became futile in their speculations, and their foolish heart was darkened [ἀλλ' ἐματαιώθησαν ἐν τοῖς διαλογισμοῖς αὐτῶν καὶ ἐσκοτίσθη ἡ ἀσύνετος αὐτῶν καρδία [conj alla but + aor.pass.ind.3p. mataioomai be futile; only here + prep en + d.a.w/noun loc.m.p. dialogiomos reasoning; "speculations" + pro.gen.m.p. autos "their" + conj kai + aor.pass.ind.3p. skotizomai become darkened + d.a.w/adj.nom.f.s. asunetos dull; without understanding; foolish + pro.gen.m.p. autos + noun nom.f.s. kardia heart]).

VERSE 22 Professing to be wise, they became fools (φάσκοντες εἶναι σοφοὶ ἐμωράνθησαν [pres.act.part.nom.m.p. phasko claim, allege; "Professing" + pres.act.infin. eimi + adj.nom.m.p. sophos wise + aor.pass.ind.3p. moraino become tastless; as in Matt. 5:13l make foolish; here and in 1 Cor. 1:20]),

VERSE 23 and exchanged the glory of the incorruptible God for an image in the form of corruptible man and of birds and four-footed animals and crawling creatures (καὶ ἤλλαξαν τὴν δόξαν τοῦ ἀφθάρτου θεοῦ ἐν ὁμοιώματι εἰκόνος φθαρτοῦ ἀνθρώπου καὶ πετεινῶν καὶ τετραπόδων καὶ ἐρπετῶν [conj. kai + aor.act.ind.3p. allasso change; exchange; Acts 6:14; 1 Cor. 15:51, 52; Gal. 4:20; Heb. 1:12 + d.a.w/noun acc.f.s. doza glory + d.a.w/adj.gen.m.s. aphthartos imperishable, immortal; incorruptible; 1 Cor. 9:25;

ANALYSIS: VERSES 21-23

- 1. In these verses Paul succinctly presents the upshot of Gentile repudiation of natural theology—that is, the universal revelation of the all-powerful Creator.
- 2. The pattern following the Tower of Babel episode, and the dispersion of the many languages into separate societies and nations, was reprobation of that which "was clearly seen" (v. 20).
- 3. This rendered people everywhere "without excuse"—hence the indictment of Gentile civilization.
- 4. Here in these verses Paul now addresses what they did with what they logically knew to be true.
- 5. The post-diluvian civilization devolved into paganism.
- 6. The pseudo deities were the product of their imagination under demon influence.
- 7. Heathenism is **not** a primeval religion from which mankind was evolving leading to monotheism.
- 8. Rather, it is the result of a falling away from the truth about God ascertained by observing the physical creation.
- 9. All humans reach a state called God-conscious.
- 10. So the heathen are not heathen because they never knew better, but because they knew and repudiated the Creator.
- 11. Paul asserts that they knew God but refused to acknowledge Him (v. 21a).
- 12. He expresses it as: "they did not honor His as God or give thanks."
- 13. To honor Him would be that they accepted the implications of natural theology.
- 14. Had they done so, they would have glorified Him but affirming His divine person and invisible attributes with special emphasis on omnipotence.
- 15. Following this mass repudiation, Paul presents a description of the ensuing religious degeneracy (v. 21b).
- 16. The words "they became futile (or vain) in their speculations/imaginations" refers to the formulation of false deities.
- 17. In other words, they made this up apart from any empirical evidence.
- 18. This they did, in violation of the logical principle of cause and effect.
- 19. The question as to how all this come into existence demands a designer with unlimited power and wisdom.
- 20. Truth rejected leads to speculation regarding the external creation.
- 21. The corollary to engaging in vain speculations is that "their foolish/stupid heart (sing for collective humanity) was darkened."

- 22. We call this the blackout of the soul.
- 23. When light (truth) is rejected darkness enters the heart.
- 24. In v. 22 Paul says that "professing to be wise, they became fools."
- 25. This is an acute (and succinct) analysis of the pretentions of pagan inventors of evil and their followers in all the nations.
- 26. V. 23 advances the observation of pagan delusion by informing the reader that there was a deliberate exchange of truth for error.
- 27. This monstrosity was the product of their negative volition at God-consciousness.
- 28. They deliberately "exchanged (aor.act.ind.3p. *allasso*) the glory of God (what could be know about the divine essence) of the incorruptible God" for that which is "corruptible" (that is, perishable).
- 29. The "incorruptible God" is a reference to the divine attribute of immutability (I).
- 30. Jam. 1:17 "Every good thing given and every perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of lights, with whom there is no variation of shifting shadow."
- 31. The willfully exchanged the incorruptible for the corruptible.
- 32. Or put another way, they gave up the divine attributes for a ridiculous image from the lower creation.
- 33. These lifeless images made by human hands were worshipped and served as if they had any positive attributes.
- 34. Finite creatures subject to physical death were the substituted for God's glory.
- 35. Images of perishable or corruptible man were set up in elaborate temples along with a priesthood to bind the people in darkness.
- 36. Not content with the worship of images of men and women, they even worshiped images of "birds and four-footed animals and crawling creatures (reptiles and insects).
- 37. The prophet Isaiah mocked this insanity (Isa. 44:9-20).
- 38. Idolatry in all its forms is forbidden in the WOG, since no idol can do justice the perfections of deity.
